

The Morton House II by Vandam



History tells us that the etherizer who first *publicly* demonstrated surgical anesthesia was William Thomas Green Morton (1819–1868). However, the muse Clío seems confused as to whether Morton was born at the site above on August 9 or 19. A retired Editor of *ANESTHESIOLOGY*, watercolorist and anesthesiologist Leroy D. Vandam (1914–2004), after visiting Morton’s birthplace, had observed that the “original Morton house was a large, square old-fashioned wooden house on a farm that was deeded to William Thomas Green Morton’s mother, Rebecca, by her father, John Stevens.” Because the original Morton house had burned, its successor was the edifice (*above*) that Professor Vandam captured with watercolors.
